

Join us for worship during the week on Facebook Live as well: Mondays for Morning Prayer at 9:30 am; Wednesdays for Evening Prayer at 5 pm.

Sunday Bible Study: TODAY at 12:30 pm via Zoom, we continue our newest Bible Study, this time on the Gospel of John. Join us for a study, using a familiar series resource, *Knowing the Bible*, as we explore the "maverick" Gospel of St. John. Study guides are available (a \$10 donation is asked, if you are able). Lent, Discipleship, and the Passion of Jesus: Join us on Wednesday nights of Lent at 5:30 pm for a light supper of soup and salad and some time for community. We will continue with a conversation around how Jesus's temptation in the wilderness (Luke and Matthew) and Luke's story of His Passion gives us wisdom, strength, and insight into how we can more closely follow Him in discipleship. We will gather on March 6<sup>th</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup>, and 20<sup>th</sup>. We hope you will join us.

Stations of the Cross: Inspired and led by our rector, we will have an opportunity to experience the Stations in a way

never done before in our parish. Each station is represented by artwork, poetry, and a traditional prayer. The art and writings are the accumulation of months of prayerful work by our parishioners who have graciously given their time for this project. Lenten Fridays at 5:30 pm are an opportunity to see their visions and interpretation of the Stations while reflecting on the Lenten season in prayer, fasting and almsgiving. If you can't join us on Friday evenings, the Stations are in the parish hall throughout Lent for you to enjoy and ponder. NOTE: we will not hold Compline on Fridays during Lent.

Do you know *The Book of Common Prayer*? One of the study offerings during this Lenten season is an opportunity to dig deeply into *The Book of Common Prayer* (BCP), those books with the red covers that sit next to the hymnals in the pew racks. We meet between the services starting around 9:20 a.m. and continue on Sundays, March 10<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>. In the March 10<sup>th</sup> session, the focus will be on the daily "offices," Morning and Evening Prayer. The final session will be about the abundance of prayers found in the last part of the book. It isn't necessary to attend all the sessions; each can stand alone. Join us as you are able!



Easter Egg Hunt! We traditionally have an Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday (March 31st this year!) after the 10:15 service. If you would like to lead/co-lead the Egg Hunt "project," please get in touch with Fr. George. We need assistance organizing the eggs' preparation, soliciting donations for stuffing the eggs, planning for and helping supervise said egg "stuffing,"

and organizing our youth/adults to hide the eggs on Easter morning. Again, please let Fr. George know soon, if you are willing to help with this Easter tradition.



Altar of Repose: On Maundy Thursday, following our 7 pm service and the Stripping of the Altar, our Lord lies in repose, in the Blessed Sacrament, in the Melissa Jane Inrig Memorial Chapel from the moment the service is over until the following morning at 7 am. We have traditionally had sign up times, where people come in person and sit an hour with Jesus during this time, memorializing the first

night he spent in the tomb. All are invited to sign up for a time via this link: <a href="https://bit.ly/StJMaundy24">https://bit.ly/StJMaundy24</a>. Multiple people can sign up for any time, but it is the late night (2, 3, 4 am) slots that are the more challenging to fill. Materials for prayer and reflection are available in the chapel, so that you may pass the Holy Hour faithfully. A brief, special time of prayer will be held in the Chapel at 7 am on Good Friday morning to conclude the Vigil.

Readers for Holy Week needed! Holy Week is the dramatic lead up to the pinnacle of the Church year: Easter. Holy Week helps ensure that we don't take a short cut from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday and thereby miss the opportunity to share in Christ's

Passion. The story of our salvation is held between Palm Sunday and Easter. There will, accordingly, be a full complement of services during Holy Week, beginning on Palm Sunday, March 24<sup>th</sup>. We have traditionally asked folks



to read various parts during the several services of Holy Week. Please sign up at <a href="https://bit.ly/StJHolyWk24">https://bit.ly/StJHolyWk24</a> to read at a service. We ask that you sign up for **one** service at this time so that we may offer the openings to as many folks as wish to take part. Fr. George will send you the section/reading you will be responsible for based on what you sign up to read (Narrator vs. Character). Please consider doing a reading.

The lectionary readings for next Sunday, March 10<sup>th</sup> are: Numbers 21:4–9, Psalm 107:1–3, 17–22; Ephesians 2:1–10; John 3:14–21.

Register for Walking with Grief – a guided caring circle. Walking with Grief is a guided caring circle for those who have experienced a life loss. The group offers a safe place to share one's grief journey and to hold space for the grief of others. Deep listening, compassion, camaraderie, and self-care are some of the goals of this series. The group will meet in-person here at St. James from 1:30 to 3 pm for 8 consecutive weeks starting Wednesday, April 3<sup>rd</sup> and ending on May 22<sup>nd</sup>. The registration fee is \$80. A reduced rate is available to those with financial limitations.
