The Lion's Pause with Allison Penick Confessions of a White Privileged Person

Am I racist? I have always said, "I am not." I've discovered that is not the whole truth. I was born in 1960 and too young to experience the raw emotional demand for racial equality in the Civil Rights Era. I grew up in Northfield, MA, where I rarely saw blacks or any kind of diversity. While I would not intentionally mistreat any human being, I was unaware that my "white privilege" helped me escape the struggles a black person had. I did not have to worry that the color of my skin (which one can't hide) might be a strike against me when applying to a college or for a job or just walking down the street.

Now, *I* am struggling to find my way. I confess that I fear losing any security I have because of my "white privilege". I am not an activist by nature, and violence scares me. Diplomatic compromise and negotiation are my way. Sometimes peaceful protests turn into violent mobs destroying property and injuring people. Basic laws are broken. Those responsible must be held accountable. Therein lies the bigger question. We, the white privileged, have broken the most basic "law" of our Christian faith. We are all equal in God's eyes. "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Jesus taught the way of love. We need to be held accountable.

But how?

This discrimination has been going on for an eternity. It has entwined itself into every part of our institutions, communities, and economy. It is so complicated. Change can't be made in a day, but silence and ignoring the problem are not an option. I have a few ideas that only touch the tip of the iceberg.

Education—making everyone aware of the inequities—hence the peaceful protests. I am grateful to be a member of the Episcopal Church in CT which has resolved to "Acknowledge and Confront Systemic Racism, White Supremacy, and Anti-Black Bias in Our Nation and CT." This continues the "Season of Racial Healing, Justice and Reconciliation. I am grateful for the open discussion about The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Letter from the Birmingham Jail that Bishop Laura led on the fifth Sunday of Lent. I was struck by her example of an ECCT policy change for equality. Every job offering must have a black person as one of the 3 finalists. In one search,

they had to wait 9 months before a black person even applied! Perhaps our bias shows in the very words of a job description?

Reparations—I read an article reporting that on March 22nd, the city council of Evanston, IL, would vote to begin distributing \$400K in grants to black residents. This would be the first instance of a U.S. city issuing reparations for decades of racist government policies. I confess that I'm mixed up about this one. I must give up a portion of my financial security for something I did not do? But, in a sense I did. And sacrifice to help those in need is part of our Christian faith.

Getting to Know Each Other—this is my favorite. St. Mark's is my cherished family. I have so many friends with all sorts of backgrounds. I accept them as they accept me. Yet, after years of friendship, recently I've found that I don't always know the private parts of their lives. As we talk about anti-black bias, I am learning so much about their struggles. I can come closer to understanding their pain and worries. I am grateful for their patience. I am motivated to help. (Once I figure out how!)

Dear friends,
