An Uncommon Word Sparks Thought

Cudgel: A short, thick stick used as a weapon. This word is not a part of my everyday vocabulary, but I found it used twice this week.

The first time was in a Hartford Courant editorial (July 11th by Jonah Goldberg) about critical race theory (CRT). Mr. Goldberg's premise was that both defenders and critics are missing the point. "CRT is an academic tool invented to help explain why racial problems endure even when conscious racism is no longer pervasive. It has morphed into a *cudgel* to accuse people of racism if they don't agree with the proposed diagnosis or the cure." I feel our world is filled with catch phrases (DACA, voting rights, Obamacare) for ideas that spark strong feelings. The words start as an easy way of identifying a topic and turn into bludgeons. Such attacks put everyone on the defensive and we stop listening to each other. That is not a good way to reach a compromise.

The second time I heard the word was during Stephen Hard's wonderful sermon on July 18th. We had read Psalm 23: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." This psalm describes the comfort and protection we receive from our Lord Jesus. A shepherd carries a shepherd's hook which is essentially a long stick shaped with a curved hook at one end. A shepherd can use it as a "*cudgel*" to ward off anything endangering his flock. This is certainly an appropriate use when faced with an attacking wolf! However, is it appropriate to use words as cudgels when people have conflicting ideas?

My answer is "no". I prefer the other use of the shepherd's staff. Let's use the curved hook to draw people back to the fold, a place where we are all accepted as equals and can express difficult ideas without fear of reprisal. I believe Jesus would agree. His is "The Way of Love". If we must use catch phrases, let them be "Love" and "Peace" and "Empathy".

There is also a telephone number that can be used to join the Zoom service: 1-646-558-8656

(phone charges may apply for the telephone call if you do not have unlimited calling).

If you are using a telephone to dial into the service: dial the zoom phone number, and then wait to be prompted by the voice to enter the meeting number. Then, enter the meeting number, and as part of the meeting number, please add the "pound" sign (#) at the end of the meeting number (as the verbal instructions direct).

The Zoom broadcast opens at 9:45 am when remote participants can be admitted and will be greeted by the e-verger.

Remote participants are encouraged to stay connected after the service and greet and be greeted during the coffee hour.

A WORD FROM FR. SHAW

Dear friends,

Welcome to August!

10 am Sunday hybrid worship services have been getting underway, one step at a time.

In August, the Vestry plans to be looking ahead a bit, as much as it can.

And in the midst of all that goes on, around us, people of St. Mark's continue with ministries in the community, pastoral care, worship services, education, and more.

In the midst of it all, I find myself drawing more and more on God's strength, day by day, and that helps me in all kinds of endeavors.

From time to time, some people ask me how to draw upon God's strength. My answer has become a bit more focused than it used to be. Basically, this:

In prayer I ask God to interact in my life with God's Holy Spirit. And sometimes, that means waiting, and sometimes that means action, and sometimes that means a team effort, in all aspects of my life, not just my vocation.

With different people, the Holy Spirit's interaction may manifest differently, depending on what is on their plate.

An analogy might be: thinking of God being alongside you if you are walking, riding a bicycle, driving a car, or flying in an airplane. God is there, regardless of the mode of transportation or the rate of speed.

So, to apply this, think: what might God be calling you to do, or to be? In thought, word, or deed? What is your vision? What about your relationship with God and with others? What might you be doing that needs to be done, as a response to something you are experiencing, or have read about, or have witnessed? What's on your plate? When might you be doing this?

How might God's Holy Spirit come alongside and/or better equip you for the fulfillment of that desire, in light of your responses to those questions?

To this end, the following prayer may be helpful (and then, after praying it, perhaps note what happens over time):

Heavenly Father, Loving God, we ask that your Holy Spirit would interact with our lives this August, this week, today, that all would be done in your way, in your time, and to your glory. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.
